

Margot Fröhlinger graduated from Saarbrücken University with a law degree in 1976. Her post-graduate qualifications consist of the German professional law qualification (1979) and a doctorate in law from Trier University (1981).

From 1979 to 1983 she worked as senior assistant and lecturer in constitutional, administrative and European law at Trier University.

From 1983 to 1987 she was a judge at several courts in Germany.

In 1987 she joined the Commission of the European Communities. Her first posting was in the Commission's Directorate General for Competition where she dealt with banking, insurance and commerce and later with media and distributive trades.

Since 1994 she was in charge of different policy areas in the Commission's Directorate General for the Internal Market where since 2006 she dealt with intellectual property including the creation of a Unified European Patent Court and the unitary patent.

She has been lecturing on intellectual property rights at the Universities of Aix-en-Provence, Paris (Université Paris1-Panthéon-Sorbonne) and Leuven.

In April 2012 she joined the European Patent Office where she is Principal Director for Unitary Patent, European and International Legal Affairs. In this function she deals with issues such as the development of patent law at European and international levels, patent law harmonisation, the strengthening and improvement of the PCT system, as well as with the implementation of the Unitary Patent and the EPO's relation with the UPC Preparatory Committee.
